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Welcome to Bookbuzz!

Bookbuzz is an exciting reading programme specially developed by children's reading charity BookTrust to encourage young people to keep picking up books and turning the page.

As well as being fun, reading regularly has a significant impact on students' wellbeing, imagination and language skills. Unfortunately, reading frequently declines once young people reach adolescence.

Bookbuzz can help you bring reading to life in your school and inspire your students to become lifelong readers.

With 16 fantastic titles to choose from, we're sure every student will find something they love.

Let's get started!

Bookbuzz in five easy steps

Step 1

Get ready for Bookbuzz

Tell your students about Bookbuzz so they can spread the word and create a buzz about reading in your school.

Step 2

Launch Bookbuzz

There are lots of ways to launch Bookbuzz. We have some ideas included in this guide on page 6.

Step 3

Collect students' choices and place your order

Ask your students to mark their choices on their bookmarks and hand them back to you. Then log in to your account on the Bookbuzz website (booktrust.org.uk/bookbuzz) to tell us how many copies of each book you want.

We'll send you an email to let you know when your books are on their way.

Step 4

Your books arrive

This is the fun part. You can give students their books in lessons or host a special event, such as a Bookbuzz breakfast or festival!

Step 5

Keep the buzz going

The buzz doesn't have to stop when the books arrive – this guide has lots of ideas to keep that love of reading going. Find out what other schools are up to on page 17, check out the **More great books** section on page 18, and visit our website to take part in the Bookbuzz challenge, competitions and quizzes.

11 September

Extra student deadline

22 September

If you need to add more students to your order (minimum of five), please contact bookbuzz@booktrust.org.uk by this date. Payment must be received for all students, including extra students, before we can take your order.

Early Bird ordering deadline

29 September

Order your students' books online by this date and get a free set of children's books (while stocks last).

Final ordering deadline

20 October

You must order your students' books by this date to guarantee they receive their chosen book.

Books arrive

By the end of the autumn term

As long as you have ordered by 20 October, your order should arrive by the end of the autumn term.

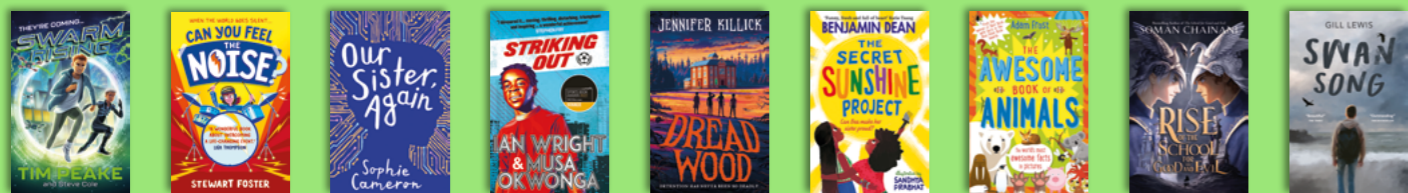

What's available online?

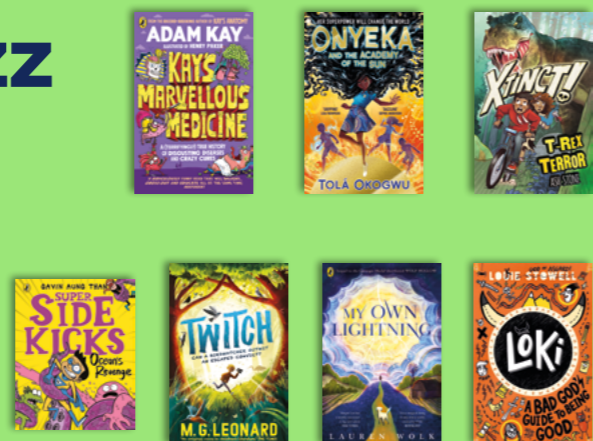

Launching Bookbuzz in your school

Reading is just part of the fun! Bookbuzz is all about giving students a choice to find a book they'll enjoy. Here's how you can support them in the process:



Prepare the school for Bookbuzz

- **Read this guide** and **watch the Bookbuzz film** in the coordinator area of our website so you get to know the Bookbuzz titles and can help students choose the book that's right for them.
- Share the Bookbuzz books with your colleagues to **spread the word** about Bookbuzz. You can even encourage staff to put up a 'My Bookbuzz book is...' sign in their classrooms and talk about why they chose that title.
- **Tell parents and carers** that your school is taking part in Bookbuzz. You can even use Bookbuzz to inspire a love of reading at home. A template parent and carer letter can be downloaded from the coordinator area.

Launch Bookbuzz with the students

- Get your students talking about the books by **creating a display in your library or classroom** using the poster and books in your launch pack.
- **Show your students the Bookbuzz film**, which includes a short introduction to each book. You may want to pause between each book and ask the students to discuss what they've seen.
- Let students **flick through the Bookbuzz books** so they can get an impression of the look and length of each title.
- Encourage students to **focus on what they like**, helping them to match their interests and reading habits to one of the 16 books.

Your guide to the Bookbuzz books

With help from a panel of school librarians, teachers and children's reading advocates, we've selected 16 books for this year's Bookbuzz programme that we think students aged 11 to 13 will love.

To support you in helping students make their choice, the next few pages contain some information on each of the Bookbuzz titles. This includes a short description of the book, key themes and who it might appeal to. There are also some recommended reads to help your students find their next book.



Swarm Rising

Genre: action, adventure, quest, science fiction

Key themes: science, space, alien life, human rights, superpowers, gaming

Perfect for: anyone who loves a fast-paced action/adventure with life-threatening danger

Synopsis

Years ago, humans sent a message into space to try to communicate with extra-terrestrial lifeforms. Now, an alien swarm has intercepted it – and they have terrifying plans for Earth. Teenager Danny just wants to play video games with his best friend Jasmine, but then he meets Adi. A strange energy-based being who travels through the internet and bends the laws of physics, Adi delivers the dire warning of the Swarm's arrival. Can Adi, Danny and Jasmine find a way to stop the all-powerful Swarm from destroying human civilisation?

Key themes: bereavement (death of a sibling), artificial intelligence, family, crime, secrets, ethics, LGBTQ+

Perfect for: those who like emotionally intelligent stories with a mystery, surprising twists and things to make you think

Synopsis

Isla's sister Flora died three years ago. They miss her terribly, so when Isla's family are offered the chance to participate in a top-secret project which recreates loved ones as lifelike AI robots, they take it. Now Flora is home again and it's wonderful. But is this Flora really the same as the Flora they lost? And some people in their small island community are unhappy about her return: someone is sending threatening messages. It's up to Isla to find out who – and why.

Can You Feel the Noise?

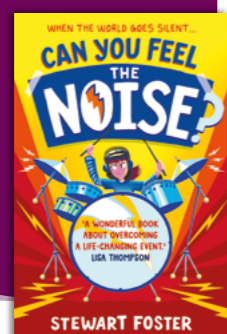

Perfect for: readers who love stories that reflect everyday life, real-life challenges and the ups and downs of friendship

Synopsis

Sophie loves playing guitar and is really excited that her band is in the Battle of the Bands final. But Sophie is experiencing hearing loss, and everything is turned upside-down when she becomes completely deaf. Everything feels strange, conversations must be lip-read and her friends don't really understand what's happening. What will this mean for her music and her place in the band? But as Sophie navigates a silent world and changing friendships, she learns to experience music in a whole new way.

Genre: sport, drama, real life

Key themes: football, self-empowerment, racism and bullying, grief (death of a parent), domestic abuse (main character), courage, school

Perfect for: sports fans and those who want a story about real-life challenges and figuring out where you belong

Synopsis

Jerome dreams of becoming a professional footballer. But things at home are difficult, especially with his stepdad, and Jerome has lost his confidence. Then a chance meeting with legendary striker Ian Wright changes everything. Jerome's offered an exciting football scholarship at a prestigious school. But finding his place in the new school isn't easy, plus Jerome must also contend with racist bullying and an increasingly stressful home life. With Ian's guidance, can Jerome turn his fortunes around?

Perfect for: anyone who loves a page-turning story full of suspense, scares and twists and turns

Synopsis

At school for a Saturday detention, Hallie, Angelo, Gustav and Naira think things can't get much worse. They're wrong: the school grounds are hiding a creepy secret and things are about to get seriously scary. One minute their teacher is handing out their chores and the next he's dragged underground by some unseen horror. And that's just the beginning... In danger and cut off from help, the group must work together to survive, and to figure out why the four of them have been targeted.

Perfect for: readers who like a joyful and heart-warming story about family, friendship and celebrating who you are

Synopsis

Last year, after her sister Riley came out, Bea and her family had the best day ever at London Pride. But shortly afterwards, their dad died, and everything has been grey ever since. Now they've had to move to their gran's rural village for the summer and can't even go to Pride again. Bea hates how sad Riley has become. Deciding it's time for their lives to be full of colour again, Bea sets out to bring Pride to the countryside – that'll be easy, right?

Genre: non-fiction

Key themes: animals, nature, facts, infographics

Perfect for: fact lovers, visual thinkers and those requiring a more accessible book with less text

Synopsis

This highly visual book of facts and infographics is full of fascinating, funny, shocking or surprising information about animals from all around the world – humans included. Which four-footed creature is the best at defying gravity? Which animal travels the most during its lifetime? A brilliant book to dip in and out of; find out who is the most successful hunter, the strangest laws humans have made for animals and which creature doesn't have a heart. Which fact will be your favourite?

Genre: fantasy, adventure, fairy tales

Key themes: good versus evil, sibling rivalry, school, magic, stories, loyalty, morality

Perfect for: those who love adventure, magic and stories full of twists and turns; those looking for a 'stretch' read

Synopsis

Have you ever wondered how fairy tales come to be? Well, they all begin at the School for Good and Evil, where students learn how to become either heroes or villains. When twins Rhian and Rafal are appointed masters of the school, they're tasked with maintaining the balance between the two sides. But when a new student threatens that balance, chaos breaks out. As the brothers struggle to regain control, their courage and loyalty is tested at every turn. Who will survive to rule the school?

Swan Song

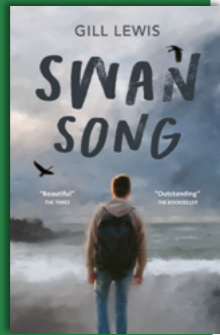

Key themes: mental health, nature, protecting the environment, family, friendship, experiencing change, bravery, school expulsion

Perfect for: those who like a story about school struggles, new friendships and finding your path; those who prefer a shorter, super-readable story printed in a dyslexia-friendly format

Synopsis

Since starting secondary school, Dylan has been struggling a lot and getting into trouble. Now, after punching a classmate, he's been expelled, and he and his mum have moved to Wales to live with his grandad. At first it seems there's nothing to do there, but as Grandad introduces Dylan to the local nature, Dylan's unhappiness begins to lift. So when the things he's come to value are threatened, Dylan must use what he's learnt to find a way to navigate the latest challenges.

Kay's Marvellous Medicine

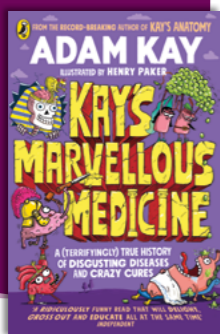

Perfect for: anyone who loves non-fiction or a fun book to dip in and out of

Synopsis

Did you know that in the Middle Ages people believed our brains were powered by spirits moving around inside them? Or that the Ancient Greeks used to taste people's vomit to work out what was wrong with them? This is a hilarious whirlwind tour of all things medical: from the brilliant people making medical discoveries, to the odd things that doctors used to believe about how illnesses worked, and what we know today about the inner workings of the human body – gross bits included.

Genre: fantasy, quest, action

Key themes: superpowers, family, secrets, conspiracy, bravery, identity

Perfect for: those who love empowering action-adventure stories and superpowered heroes

Synopsis

Onyeka has grown up always feeling different and is certain her mum is keeping secrets from her. But it's still a big surprise when she discovers she has superpowers, inherited from her missing father. She is 'Solari', an elite group of Nigerians with special abilities. After joining the Academy of the Sun, where Solari are trained, Onyeka begins to develop her unique powers and untangle the secrets her mum – and the Solari – are hiding, including one that puts her and her new friends in grave danger...

Key themes: science/science fiction, dinosaurs, environmental protection

Perfect for: those who prefer a more accessible, illustrated text with clear layout, dyslexia-friendly font and a lower word count

Synopsis

After an accident in the lab where Jeevan's mum studies the DNA of fossils, a selection of extinct creatures are brought back to life: a Neanderthal, a dodo and, perhaps most worryingly, a T-Rex. Jeevan hopes this amazing discovery means they'll be able to bring other extinct species back too. But first he needs to somehow capture the fully grown T-Rex that is rampaging through the woods – preferably before the mysterious hunters who've been scouting out the forest catch it first.

Key themes: superheroes, plastic waste, ocean pollution, working together

Perfect for: those who enjoy comic-style storytelling with lots of action and humour

Synopsis

Something strange is happening: all the plastic waste in the Great Pacific Rubbish Patch has coalesced into one giant plastic super-creature, and it's heading for the city! Plus, something tentacled is kidnapping the world's superheroes. With the superheroes missing, it's up to the Super Sidekicks JJ, Flygirl, Dinomite and Goo to stop the plastic monster and find out who or what is controlling it – and what they want. It's not just their city that is at stake, but the future of the world's oceans...

Key themes: birds and nature, bullying, friendship, truth, stolen money

Perfect for: those who love an adventure/mystery with daring characters and wildlife

Synopsis

Twitch has a passion for nature, especially birds, and is looking forward to spending the summer in his secret den in Aves Wood. But suddenly there are police everywhere: a dangerous robber has escaped from prison and was spotted in the area. Twitch's bird-watching skills make him the perfect detective: patience, careful observation and a thorough knowledge of the terrain. Accidentally caught up in the search for the prisoner and their missing loot, can Twitch discover the real truth behind the prisoner's crime?

Perfect for: those who enjoy a quieter, more literary and character-driven story; readers looking for a 'stretch' read

Synopsis

Annabelle is walking home from school when she's caught in a summer storm and struck by lightning. Afterwards, everything feels different: not only are her normal senses heightened, but now she can also tell what animals are feeling. As the summer unfolds, Annabelle tries to understand her new ability and to unlock the mysteries that surround her, such as who saved her life in the storm, her brother's missing dog, their strange new neighbours, a devastating event from the previous year – and why people do the things they do.

Perfect for: anyone who loves a laugh-out-loud story with comedy capers and a hilarious lead character

Synopsis

After playing one trick too many, badly behaved trickster god Loki has been sent to live on Earth as an eleven-year-old boy. Nightmare! Forbidden from using his godly powers, he must prove that he can mend his ways to be allowed back home. To provide evidence of this 'moral improvement' he records his everyday thoughts and activities in this diary. As he deals with the indignities of school and chores, will Loki ever make any progress in figuring out right from wrong, or friends from enemies?

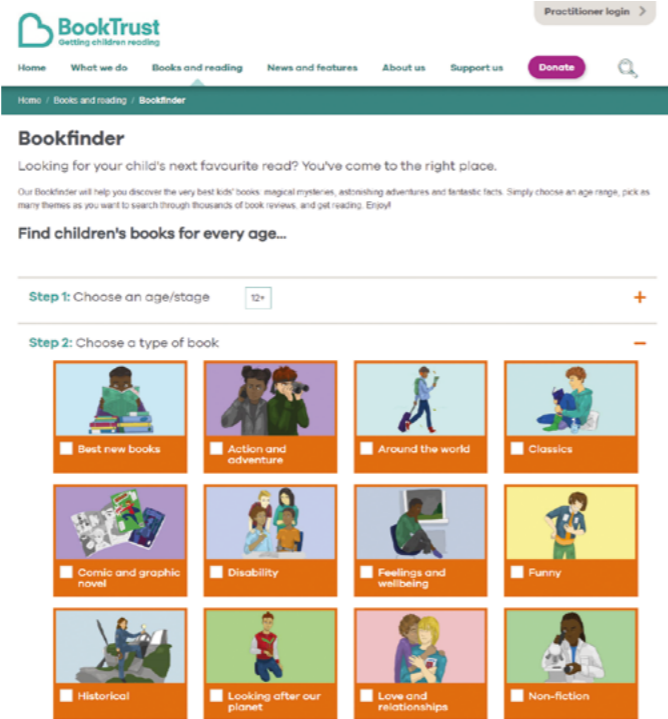

Keep the buzz going

Your books are here! So, what's next?

Keep students engaged in reading with some of the following ideas:

- Encourage students to **make film trailers for their Bookbuzz books** to share with other students.
- **Host a 'battle of the books'** with students who want to read all the Bookbuzz books by pitting one book against another (like a sports bracket competition) until one book is crowned champion.
- **Make a library display** of other books by the Bookbuzz authors or the additional books recommended in this guide.
- **Create a 'swap sheet'** so students can swap their books with another student and then share lunch in the library to discuss their two selected books.
- **Arrange an author visit** (in-person or virtual) from one of the Bookbuzz authors or another favourite author through Authors Aloud: authorsalouduk.co.uk
