
Mr Vinegar: Activity explainer (to be used alongside video)

How to make a story map

Purpose: to encourage children to map the rhyming story visually, step by step, to remember cause and effect, and to use visual story maps as a reminder when they are telling the story and sharing the poem.

Step 1: Gather materials

Paper, pencils, coloured pencils or felt-tips - try and make the story maps visually exciting.



Step 2: What are the steps of the story?

- Ask your group to help remind you of what happens in the poem.
- Draw out each stage visually you may end up with more visuals than I have in the video.
- Ask them to help add details orally e.g. "What colour cow was it?" You may also want to help them imagine some of the more complicated visuals for themselves e.g. show them some images of bagpipes.
- Ask them to help you to put the images in narrative order depending on what happens in Mr Vinegar's story.







Step 3: Create a story map

Note: You can do this as a whole group, or in small groups on a large piece of paper, or individually.

Importantly, your story map doesn't have to look anything like mine! You might find using a series of boxes will help them order the story clearly e.g.



Or you (and they) may enjoy finding another visually exciting and creative way of mapping out what happens in the poem!

Step 4: Tell Mr Vinegar's story

Use the story maps to help tell Mr Vinegar's story. Some tips and tricks:

- Get them to work in pairs to tell the story back and forth to each other and help each other out.
- Set up a "storytelling chair" where each child can have a go at telling the story (you can help to prompt them or show them their maps as they go).
- Layer in some key gestures to help remind them of the stages of the poem, like the ones I use in the video e.g.

"Mr Vinegar walked, cam wrth gam" – walking motion on flat palm

"Back home I go, bant â fi" – gesturing over shoulder

You can make up some of your own if you want to! What gesture represents Mr Vinegar? Or the bagpipes?



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
