Tips for parents



Talking about and recording different types of weather will help your child to develop their speech, language, communication and maths skills in the early years.



There are daily record sheets available on our website at booktrust.org.uk/myweatherwatch. You can either print the record sheets and summary sheets to fill them in or edit them as digital resources.



Talk to your child about what day of the week it is. They might like to underline the day of the week or try to copy it in the space provided. Then, ask them what type of weather they can see that morning or afternoon. If it's mixed, you could introduce questions like 'is it more sunny, or cloudy?' to really help them to develop their reasoning language and communication skills. Every record sheet also has a space for children to draw a picture to help them remember what they were doing that day. If you're using printed sheets, your child can draw a picture here or you can help them to search for some appropriate weather pictures online if you're using the digital version.
