Published to coincide with Children's Book Week, Book Trust's Best Book Guide brings together reviews of some of our favourite books for children and young people published within the last year.

Children's Book Week celebrates reading for pleasure and – to help you find the right books for your readers – we've created this guide, to support children's love of reading and help young minds grow.

The reviews are grouped into five age categories:

- 0-5 years
- 6-8 years
- 9-11 years
- 12-14 years
- 14 years and over

To help guide you, we have recommended a suitable reading age for each title. This refers to the age at which a child is likely to be able to read the text themselves. We have also suggested an interest age – the age at which we think children will start to enjoy the book.

Please Mr Panda

Mr Panda has a tray of delicious-looking doughnuts. He wants to share them, so he politely asks all the animals he meets if they would like one. A penguin, a skunk and a whale all say 'yes', but for some reason, Mr Panda changes his mind each time. It is only when Lemur remembers to say the magic word that Mr Panda is happy to share his tasty treats.

This is a witty and stylishly-presented picture book, in which the black and white animal characters create a vivid contrast with the brightly-coloured doughnuts. Children will love looking through the beautifully-designed page spreads time and time again – and will also pick up on the story's simple but all-important message: good manners will get you anything, including doughnuts!

They will need to work together to find a way to escape the island and find their way back to their cold but comforting home.

Rob Biddulph's debut picture book will charm even the youngest children with its simple rhyme and clean, bright artwork. Gorgeously designed and illustrated, this is an immediately appealing book that announces the arrival of a new picture book talent. A deserving winner of the 2015 Waterstones Children's Book Prize.


Over the Hills and Far Away

Within the covers of this beautifully-presented collection, readers will find rhymes from all over the English-speaking world. Each page offers something new to discover, from a Trinidadian clapping rhyme, to a Scottish nursery rhyme, to vibrant rhythms from Native American and Maori cultures. The same diversity is reflected in the illustrations: each spread has been created by a different artist, including the likes of Nick Sharratt, Shaun Tan, Marcia Williams, Axel Scheffler, Satoshi Kitamura and many more.

This is a treasure trove of nursery rhymes that belongs on every bookshelf. All royalties from sales of the book will go to Seven Stories, Britain's National Centre for Children's Books.

In a series of bold, single colour page spreads, the boy and his bear investigate all kinds of possible homes where bears of different sorts might be found – a toy shop, a zoo, a circus, a forest, a cave and a jungle – before at last, back at home, the fridge gives the boy the best idea of all.

In her debut picture book, Sophie Henn presents a delightful tale about a boy, a bear, and finding a place to call home. Full of warmth and humour, this is a picture book that will have plenty of appeal for little readers.

Turn the pages of this large format book to discover twenty six (very) short stories, which introduce us to a host of new characters - from dynamic duo Owl and Octopus, to Edmund the astronaut with his awkward fear of heights. (Fans of Jeffers's previous books will find a few familiar faces to spot as well!)

Gloriously-illustrated in Jeffers's distinctive style, it's easy to see why this book was selected as Children's Books Ireland's Book of the Year. A gorgeouslypresented picture book that will delight children and parents alike.

But when books start disappearing from PC Puddle's shelf, it's time for Ralfy to learn the difference between borrowing and stealing...

Little book lovers will adore this story about naughty Ralfy. The illustrations are fun, with lots to look at – sharp eyed young readers may even spot the appearance of the Bookstart Bear in one page spread. A great tribute to the value of libraries – a place where Ralfy can take whatever books he fancies, the only condition being that they are returned so someone else can enjoy them – this is a delightful picture book that deserves to be shared time and time again.

There's a new baby in the family! It's a lot of fun being a sister or brother, but there are some simple rules to follow to make sure baby is safe and happy.

Full of tongue-in-cheek helpful advice like 'don't peg the baby on the washing line' and 'don't swap the baby for a guinea pig', this picture book will delight toddlers who are dealing with a new arrival. Holly Sterling's illustrations are inclusive, fresh and fun, with some lovely silly scenes as baby is put in all sorts of perilous (cuddling an octopus!) and not so perilous (eating all the chocolate!) situations. A sweet picture book that is certain to make young readers giggle.

The robust flaps are just right for little fingers to lift easily, and the atmospheric illustrations from Simona Dimitri vividly conjour up the night time world. Perfect for sharing and enjoying together, this is makes the ideal bedtime book.

Little Monster revels in his sharp claws, spiky teeth and terrifying roar; he's often slimy and stinky and loves bug-eye stew. Don't ever pat him on the head. And don't ever, EVER, call him 'sweet'. Little Monster's mission is to terrify everyone he meets... or at least it is until he meets someone even more monstrous than himself.

With a lively rhyming text, this is a lovely book for reading aloud. The lively illustrations veer from dark chaos to demure pastels, expressing visually Little Monster's inner contradictions. Great fun for small monsters who wish they were bigger!

Little Red sets out to visit her auntie, who is poorly. She walks under the giraffes, over the sleepy crocodiles, past the enormous elephants, and by the chattering monkeys. Then a Very Hungry Lion approaches, wanting to gobble her up! But despite all his cunning plans, Little Red proves much smarter than Lion, and soon takes charge...

This delightful spin on the classic fairy-tale by bestselling illustrator Alex T Smith is set against a vibrantly coloured African landscape. Visually stunning, with lots of clever touches that will make both parents and children smile, this is a gorgeously warm and fun-filled take on a much-loved story that young readers will find impossible to resist.

El Deafo

Written and illustrated by Cece Bell

Based on the childhood of US author/illustrator Cece Bell, this graphic novel starts when Cece is four, and is diagnosed as deaf following a bout of meningitis. As the story progresses, Cece faces the challenges of starting school where she is the only deaf child, and must learn to understand other people's reactions and attitudes.

Cece soon discovers she has a 'superpower' – her Phonic Ear (an unwieldy 1970s hearing device) can enable her to hear what teachers are up to when they leave the classroom, gaining her the admiration of her classmates. She soon finds friends, and by the end of the story, is successfully becoming the 'El Deafo' alter ego of her imagination – capable of taking on the world.

With quirky illustrations and an engaging comic strip format, this is a story told with great charm and plenty of humour – whilst also offering readers a fascinating insight into what it can be like to be severely or profoundly deaf.

And her hair is short. Very short. But strangest of all, she LOVES school dinners. No one likes school dinners. There's only one explanation... the new girl must be a SPY!

Packed full of hilarity, excitement and fun, *The Spy Who Loved School Dinners* is a real stand-out. The engaging plot, bold illustrations and short, sharp chapters make it a perfect book for children to tackle independently. The winner of the Best Story category in the 2015 Blue Peter Book Awards, this lively and humorous story is guaranteed to grab the reader's attention.

Just one of a wealth of beautiful new illustrated children's non-fiction titles that have recently hit bookshop shelves, this book is a must for young nature enthusiasts. Those who enjoy this title will also love *Beautiful Birds* by Jean Roussen and Emmanuelle Walker, another visually-arresting non-fiction book, this time about bird life.

The Sleeper and the Spindle


Written by Neil Gaiman and illustrated by Chris Riddell

A young queen's wedding preparation is interrupted when she hears of a strange sickness travelling across the land, causing everyone in its path to fall into a slumber. Swapping her gown for armour, she sets out to save her people, determined to locate the sleeping princess whose curse is engulfing her kingdom. But in this fairy-tale, things are not as they seem – and rescuing the princess may not necessarily result in 'happy ever after'.

Neil Gaiman has teamed up with newly appointed Waterstones Children's Laureate 2015-2017 Chris Riddell to combine two well-known fairy stories, challenging all of the reader's expectations in the process. The female characters are powerful and in control of their own destiny, creating a contrast with the traditional fairy-tale princess; whilst Riddell's dark, luscious illustrations create an atmosphere of magic and menace. Both children and adults will be enthralled by this spectacular picture book.

Shackleton's Journey


Written and illustrated by William Grill

In 1914, Ernest Shackleton and his brave crew set out to cross the frozen waters of Antarctica. Ahead of them lay unimaginable danger – ferocious seas, uncharted mountains, ice and snow. This is the story of how they endured the hardships they faced, and ultimately managed to survive their perilous adventure.

To mark the 100th anniversary of the expedition, William Grill has created a stunning non-fiction book, which combines informative text with a wealth of detailed, coloured pencil drawings. Each page layout is perfectly designed, making clever use of white space to evoke the bleakness of the Antarctic landscape.

Whilst the tale of a long-ago failed expedition may seem a niche subject for a children's book, there's no doubt that young readers will be fascinated by this book and will be attracted by all the quirky details, such as the drawings of all 99 of Shackleton's sled dogs. Carefully-researched and thought-provoking, this is a stand-out work of illustrated non-fiction, which was awarded the 2015 CILIP Kate Greenaway Medal.

In this story, Dixie and Percy are off on holiday – but when fabulous popstar Peaches Miaow has her priceless diamond necklace stolen from the Hotel Splendide, it's up to the dashing duo to solve the mystery.

This gentle illustrated storybook is full of fun: with a short chapter for each day of the week, and lots of added extras, it makes perfect reading for newlyindependent readers. The attractive spreads in a bold colour palette immediately catch the eye, and the compact, chunky format is ideal for small fingers to manage.





Animalium




The Astounding Broccoli Boy


Demolition Dad

The Imaginary



Boy in the Tower



Although it may sound like a science-fiction tale, *The Boy in the Tower* reads more like a fable about friendship, loyalty and bravery. Told in the voice of a lonely boy trying to make sense of everything going on around him - from the extraordinary events he sees from his window, to his mother's illness – it is set in a convincingly urban, multicultural environment that will be familiar to many readers. 
Darkmouth



Half a King

Written by Joe Abercrombie

Prince Yarvi never wanted, or expected, to be king. He cannot grip a shield or swing a sword – but when his father and brother are killed, he must take on the responsibility of leading his people. Intrigue and betrayal soon snatch the throne from him, casting him into the icy waters of the Shattered Sea. Yarvi swears he will have revenge – but what can he do from the confines of a slave ship, where the physical and mental hardships are overwhelming?

From the first page, Yarvi's story is gripping, fast-paced and impossible to put down. Set in a vividly-imagined fantasy world, this coming-of-age tale explores complex questions of morality, loyalty and obligation. 


The Great War




Simon vs the Homo Sapiens Agenda


The Darkest Part of the Forest
