


Looking Good! by Ailie Busby



Talking - Ask your child to find different body parts. Can they point at their toes or wriggle them? Can they touch your nose?


Sharing - Let your child have fun opening and closing the flaps. Don't worry if they rip them as you can always use some sticky tape to fix them!

Listening - Try reading some bits quietly or loudly to make it more fun. You could try whispering or shouting, 'So do !!'









Talking - As your child hears this story again and again, they will start to remember it. Try to encourage them to join in with 'So do I!" each time.

Sharing - Why not act out some of the animals? Can you snap your teeth like a crocodile or open your eyes really wide like a bush baby?

Listening - Encourage your child to join in with counting '1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9...10!
Coming! Ready or not!'



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
